## What Is Baptismal Regeneration?

I was raised in the state of Tennessee and encountered a very common church and introduced to a doctrine taught by them. Many of my friends attended this church, we worked and played along beside each other with many from this persuasion. I remember being told that I was going to hell because I did not attend their assembly (The Church) and that Baptists will play their piano right into hell. I would avoid these conversations with them as a young man because to be honest, I was not prepared well enough to converse with them in their debate. In the Baptist tradition we tend to call our pastors by the name Brother. We would often say Brother John or Brother Smith as a way of respect. I remember saying Bro to a local Church of Christ minister when I was a young man and the minister stopped me and said, "You are not my brother, you are my denominational friend. Only those of "THE Church" can call me brother. "While I was the pastor of the First Baptist Church in Clifton, I had two Church of Christ ministers ask to meet with me. They wanted to present me with a book written by a former Independent Fundamental Baptist pastor who was now a minister in "The Church." They proceeded to offer to purchase for our church a copy of the book for every member of the church. I was already familiar with the book and had already reviewed the book. I kindly spoke to those men and declining their offer and said, "It was sad that they had a man who was obviously ill informed in the Word and had been debated into becoming one of their followers." I told them that the one whom they chose to parade in public was not a good representative of our beliefs. The question moved to baptism when I told them "If baptism was necessary for salvation, then it took man to save man and there we differ." I also stated to them, "You know how convinced you are that Baptists are wrong and going to hell, I am 100 times more convinces that they were brain washed and misled." I personally do think there are genuine believers in this group and will go to heaven but not because they belong to "The Church" as they define it but because of the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. I do know that there are some in this organization who are not as aggressive and do not hold to the mentioned beliefs. I have had some even apologize for the others' behaviors.

I have therefore put something together that is in no way exhaustive to help one deal with this terrible doctrine and possibly help in answering their questions over baptism. While there are many other doctrinal differences this is only to deal with baptism.

# What Is Baptismal Regeneration (Church of Christ Doctrine)?

**Baptismal regeneration** is the belief that **baptism is essential for salvation** — that a person's sins are not forgiven and they are not "born again" until they are baptized in water (usually by immersion).

In the **Church of Christ**, this is taught as part of what they call **"obedient faith."** They would say:

## ♦ Their Commonly Used Proof Texts

Below are the main Scriptures cited by the Church of Christ to support baptismal regeneration:

Mark 16:16 – "He who believes and is baptized will be saved"	They say belief + baptism = salvation.	The verse continues: "but he who does not believe will be condemned." The <b>condemnation</b> is based on <b>unbelief</b> , not lack of baptism. The omission shows that belief, not baptism, is the essential condition.
Acts 2:38 – "Repent and be baptized for the forgiveness of your sins."	They claim forgiveness is granted at baptism. Peter immediately clarifies: "not the removal of dirt from the body, but an appeal to God for a good conscience through the resurrection of Jesus Christ." The <b>saving agent</b> is Christ's resurrection, not the water itself.
John 3:5 – "Unless one is born of water and the Spirit"	They say "water" means baptism.	In context, Jesus refers to spiritual cleansing promised in Ezekiel 36:25–27—"I will sprinkle clean water on you… and give you a new spirit." The "water" is symbolic of cleansing, not literal baptism.
Titus 3:5 – "He saved us through the washing of regeneration"	They claim "washing" = baptism.	The Greek <i>loutron</i> ("washing") is figurative of <b>spiritual cleansing</b> — the "regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit." It's the Spirit's work, not water.
Romans 6:3–4 – "Baptized into Christ Jesus into His death."	They say baptism unites us with Christ.	The passage uses baptism <b>figuratively</b> to describe <b>spiritual union</b> with Christ's death and resurrection — not the physical act. Paul emphasizes <i>faith</i> as the means of union (Romans 3:28; Galatians 3:26).

## ♦ Key Refutations from Scripture

## 1. Salvation is by Grace Through Faith Alone
